Maharashtra Assembly Election 2024: NMMC Removes 4,418 Banners Across Navi Mumbai

In compliance with the Model Code of Conduct (MCC) for the upcoming Maharashtra Assembly Elections 2024, the Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation (NMMC) has launched a campaign to remove unauthorized banners displayed in public spaces across the city. Over the four days from October 13 to 16, the NMMC removed 4,418 illegal banners and hoardings. The highest number, 1,139 banners, was taken down in the Belapur ward, followed by 1,005 in the Turbhe ward. The campaign was initiated under the directive of Municipal



Commissioner Dr. Kailas Shinde, with Deputy Commissioner for Encroachment Dr. Rahul Gethe overseeing

the operation. All eight divisional offices of the NMMC participated in the effort, with Assistant Commission-

ers and divisional officers coordinating the removal of unauthorized political advertisements from government, public, and private properties. In addition to banners and hoardings, other unauthorized materials such as wall paintings, posters, flags, and arches were also removed from public spaces. The NMMC, in adherence to the Election Commission's guidelines, has urged political parties and candidates to place advertisements only in designated areas

with prior approval from the election department. Failure to comply will result in legal action.

HUMAN RIGHTS AND ENVIRONMENTAL, AIR AND WATER POLLUTION

Environmental Pollution

Causes of – The basic causes for the deterioration of environment have been identified as: (i) Population explosion, (ii) Over Industrialisation, (iii) Unplanned Urbanisation, (iv) Coal burnt thermal power generation, (v) Poverty, (vi) Deforestation and (vii) An expansion in the use of efficient new technology with its associated demands on space, food and natural resources.

With the increasing industrialisation and the tendency of the majority of industries to congregate in areas which are already heavily industrialised, the problem of air pollution has begun to be felt in the country. The problem is more acute in those heavily industrialised areas which are also densely populated.

The presence in air, beyond certain limits, of various pollutants discharged through industrial emissions and from certain human activities connected with traffic, heating, use of domestic fuel, refuse incinerations, etc. has a detrimental effect on the health of the people as also on animal life, vegetation and property.

Pollution, be that air, water or noise, is menace to the society. All the developed and developing countries are facing this hazard. With the industrialisation of a country problem of pollution comes in. If it is allowed to go unabated there will be serious health hazard to the human community. It is true that industrialisation is needed for our development. No country can prosper without industrialization. At the same time, it should be the

endeavor of all to control pollution. With the industrialisation pollution will be there. It can only be minimized so that it may not endanger the human life. The Courts have to overcome hazard of pollution by taking proper measure to reduce it to the extent which may not cause health hazard. This is not the problem of one country, it is the problem of all the countries. Every country yearns for industrialisation for further development. In the process, the entire globe faces this problem. Even, the United Nations Conference on the Human Environment which was held at Stockholm in June 1972, considered with all earnest how to get rid of this menace in the civilized world. In the said conference, India also took part. It was decided in the said conference to take appropriate steps for preservation of natural resources of the earth, which among other things, included preservation of the quality of air and control of air pollution. Earlier there were legislations for prevention and control of water pollution. However, in the year 1981, in the light of resolution adopted in the

United Nations Conference, the Air (Prevention and Control of Pollution) Act, 1981 was made. This act came into force on 29.3.1981. In the said Act various devices have been prescribed to prevent and control air pollution which are very stringent in nature. Even a going industrial unit can be closed under the provisions of this Act, if the said industry or industrial unit does not take any step to conform to the requirements of the Act. As the provisions of the Act are stringent in nature, certain safeguards have also been provided to the industrial units so that the officers entrusted with the job of control may not act arbitrarily and capriciously to the detriment of the industries or industrial units. What is necessary is to take steps for growth industries containing pollution so such an extent so that no health hazard is caused. There should be checks and balances. With the end in view the present Act has been enacted. Therefore, for violation of the provisions of the Act, the authority concerned will be entitled to take appropriate steps. But, such action can be taken only in the accordance with law.

The problem of environmental pollution has been recognized as a worldwide disaster. Development without regard to the ecological equilibrium has led to an environmental crisis during the 19th and 20th centuries. Urbanisation, modernization and the race for technological and industrial development has caused the ecological imbalance.

Accident on Mumbai-Pune Expressway near Lonavala, 23 people injured as private bus collides with container truck

At least 23 people suffered injuries after a private bus collided with an unidentified container truck on the Mumbai-Pune Expressway, on Thursday. The incident took place near Lonavala in the morning. The bus was going from Kolhapur to Borivali in Mumbai when the accident occurred," Quoting a Pune Rural Police official. The official said that it appears that the driver may have fallen asleep, causing the bus to crash into a heavy vehicle, possibly a container or trailer, from behind. "11 passengers sustained serious injuries like fractures etc., while the rest suffered minor injuries," he added. The process of filing a case is underway. Meanwhile, last month, Union Minister Nitin Gadkari said that proposed 14-lane road near the Atal Setu sea bridge that will connect to Pune via a ring road will bring down traffic on Mumbai-Pune Expressway by 50 per cent

"There is huge traffic on Mumbai-Pune Expressway. A 14-lane road will be built near Atal Setu, which will further connect to Pune via a ring road and then onwards to Bengaluru. This road will bring down traffic on Mumbai-Pune Expressway by 50 per cent," he said. The Atal Setu is the country's longest sea bridge and connects Sewri in Mumbai to Navi Mumbai. In another development, the entire 701-km-long Mumbai-Nagpur expressway is expected to be thrown open to traffic by September-end when work on the final phase covering a 76-km-long stretch will be completed, providing a seamless travel option to motorists between the two big Maharashtra cities. It is the second such road project in the state after the 95-km-long Mumbai-Pune Expressway. The ₹55,000-crore high-speed corridor, alternatively referred to as a super communication expressway, passes through 392 villages spread over 10 districts.

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Remembering the Mahatma - the man who made India

On October 2 every year, we celebrate the birth anniversary of two of our great leaders — Mahatma Gandhi and Lal Bahadur Shastri. We all know what Mahatma Gandhi has done for us, but many of us are not aware who Lal Bahadur Shastri was. Also known as the 'Father of the nation', it was Mahatma Gandhi's charisma that united the nation against the British. His passion and vision kept the independence movement going until freedom was won. The most unique thing about his struggle was that it was completely non-violent. He took up the leadership of India's freedom struggle and launched many movements such as the Non-Cooperation Movement, the Civil Disobedience Movement and the Quit India Movement. He promoted the philosophy of 'Satyagraha' and 'Ahinsa'. His consistent and untiring efforts finally achieved India's Independence on 15th August, 1947. He was such a kind of person who loved non-violence and harmony. He wanted everyone to live happily in the nation in unity without any form of non-violence. He always wanted our nation to be democratic, free, and secular. But it is sad to see that nowadays many cases of violence and crimes are happening every day. We see people fighting in the name of caste, community and religion. By sacrificing all norms of material comforts, luxury and professional career, the bare-bodied Mahatma Gandhi had selflessly devoted his whole life for the mission of Indian independence from the grasp of colonial power. Yet, he was liberal and broad-minded enough to make a clear distinction between the crude British imperialism and the rich British culture, harbouring no hatred for the latter. Famous as an apostle of peace and non-violence, he was born in a middle class family on October 2, 1869, at Porbandar, a coastal city in the Indian state of Gujarat. He was an ordinary child and his mother played a key role in shaping his life and career. He was only seven years old when his family went to Rajkot where his father, Karamchand Gandhi became the Dewan. He attended a primary school, as well as high school in Rajkot. After completing his matriculation from the high school, he joined the Samaldas College in Bhavnagar. Meanwhile, his father had died in 1885. He decided to leave for England but his caste people were offended as they believed that crossing the ocean contaminates a person. However, Gandhiji was adamant and was thus formally excommunicated by his caste. He sailed on September 4, 1888, for Southampton at the age of 18. Lal Bahadur Shas-



tri was the second Prime Minister of India and the one who initiated the project to make India one of the largest producers of milk. He first dreamt of a new India. Gandhi ji had gifted us freedom, but Lal Bahadur Shastri gave the Mahatma's efforts a direction. He was a man of short stature, but of great courage and will power. He led his life with great simplicity, was very laborious and honest and was a great source of inspiration for all of us. Mahatma Gandhi's birthday, popularly known as Gandhi Jayanti, is observed on October 2 every year to mark his birth anniversary. The day is also observed as the "International day of non-violence", encouraging non-violence and harmony among the citizens of India and the world. He was the architect of our freedom struggle and his teachings have more significance in today's world. "Work is worship" was his motto in life. One more thing to mention is that Mahatma Gandhi always maintained his originality. As a barrister, he travelled to the United Kingdom and to South Africa as often as he could. He would always wear his traditional Indian attire -- the dhoti --- and would

respect the culture of his country and its customs. He would do that even though foreign nationals did not understand, like or respect it. 'Mahatma', the title given to him means 'Great Soul'. Gandhi Jayanti is one of the three national holidays of India --- the other two are Inde-

pendence Day and Republic Day. Lal Bahadur Shastri served the country as the second Prime Minister between June 1964 and January 1966 soon after Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru's death. Due to his old age, he could not continue for long. He died on January 11, 1966. While Mahatma Gandhi was a practicing Hindu, Christianity intrigued him. In his reading of the four Gospels of the Holy Bible --- Matthew, John, Luke and Mark --- he was impressed by the teachings of Jesus Christ whom Christians worshipped and followed. During his student days in London, he read the entire New Testament. The impact of the 'Sermon on the Mount' on his mind was to remain with him all his life. In volume 1 of his ten volume "The Story of Civilization", eminent historian Will Durant lauds Gandhi thus: "He did not mouth the name of Christ, but acted as if he accepted every word on the Sermon on the Mount. Mahatma Gandhi is perhaps the best example of someone who was discerning enough to reject Christianity, not Christ. He was deeply hurt by his experiences with apartheid and Christians during his time in South Africa, and it obviously stymied his relationship with Christ.

Navi Mumbai police nab man wanted in Salman Khan killing plot

Navi Mumbai Police has apprehended an accused wanted in connection with an alleged plot to kill Bollywood actor Salman Khan, an official said on Wednesday. Sukha, the accused, was apprehended from Panipat in Haryana, he said. He was being brought to Navi Mumbai and will be produced before a court on Thursday, the official added. In June this year, police claimed to have uncovered a plot to target the Bollywood star on his way to his farmhouse near Panvel. The development followed a firing outside his Bandra residence in April 2024.

6 booked for duping job aspirants of Rs 1.31 crore in Navi Mumbai

Police registered a case against six individuals for allegedly cheating several job aspirants out of Rs 1.31 crore in Maharashtra's Navi Mumbai township, an official said on Thursday. The accused contacted 20 people with the promise of clerical jobs in the Indian Railways. Between September 2022 and April 2023, they collected Rs 1.31 crore from the job aspirants through digital payments and cash transactions, according to the official from Kharghar Police Station. One of the accused misappropriated the money collected for personal use, specifically for constructing a house in Kolhapur. When the victims, all residents of Kharghar in Navi Mumbai, enquired about job placements, the accused became unresponsive and failed to return the money, the official said. Realising they were duped, the victims approached the police. Based on a complaint, the Kharghar police on Monday registered an FIR against six individuals under various Indian Penal Code sections, including 420 (cheating), 406 (criminal breach of trust), and 34 (acts done by several persons in furtherance of common intention), the official said. The police were working to track down the accused, he added.

Kharghar teenager falls victim to ₹15 lakh QR code phishing scam

A 19-year-old from Kharghar, Navi Mumbai, has become the latest victim of a QR code phishing scam, losing over ₹15 lakh to a fraudulent website claiming to offer rental apartments. The teenager, who hails from a builder's family and is pursuing a business management degree at a premier institute in Vile Parle, was searching for accommodation near his college to avoid daily commutes from Navi Mumbai. According to the statement given to the Kharghar police, the young man found a website through Google that offered assistance in locating rental properties. "He contacted the number provided on the website and met the fraudster. The youth was assured of securing accommodation in the desired location after making an initial payment of ₹10,000. A QR code was sent to his mobile number," said an officer investigating the case. The accused, identified as Deepak Chavan, orchestrated multiple transactions under the pretext of failed payments. The total sum transferred by the complainant amounted to ₹15,84,095. "The first transaction was claimed to have failed, prompting the victim to repeat the transfer. The second transaction was also reported as unsuccessful, following which the victim was asked to make a combined payment. Similar demands continued, and each time the victim complied, believing the false assurance that the debited amount would be returned if suitable accommodation wasn't found," the police explained. The scam, which began on September 24, continued until October 13, with the victim repeatedly transferring money to ten different bank accounts. "The funds transferred were his father's savings placed in his name. When the victim realised he had been duped and attempted to recover the money, the accused manipulated him into transferring even more, promising to refund the entire amount," the police added. A complaint has been registered with the Kharghar police under section 66(D) of the Information Technology Act 2000, which deals with punishment for impersonation, and sections 318(2)(4) and 319(2) of the Indian Penal Code, which pertain to cheating and carry a punishment of up to three years' imprisonment.

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KUDUMBASHREE ROLLS OUT HOME-CARE SERVICE FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

Named K 4 Care, the initiative involves a network of trained women to provide caregiver service in all districts. Call centre 91889 25597

The Kudumbashree Mission has formally launched homecare services at the State level for senior citizens, bedridden patients, and the differently abled and new-born.

Named K 4 Care, the initiative involves a network of trained women (K 4 Care executives) to provide the caregiver service in all districts. A district-level consortium and call centre facility (91889 25597) have also been established for the public to avail of the service. A press note issued by Kudumbashree said the services would be

available for hourly, daily and monthly rates. It said the care executives have also been trained to take elderly patients to hospital or bring back children from school. If an executive is not available in a particular district to provide caregiver service, here counterpart from a neighbouring district would be provided.

Soft launch success

Kudumbashree sources said 300 of the 500 caregivers who have been enlisted since the soft launch of the programme early this year had found gainful employment.

“There is a great demand for caregiver services in the State. Very often, families are constrained because of the absence of reliable home care facilities. K 4 Care is designed to address this issue”. To ensure the safety of caregivers, Kudumbashree CDS units will collect information about the household soliciting the service and the local CDS unit will be informed once they are engaged by the household.

A total of 1,000 caregivers were expected to receive training and find work by March 2025.

Remembering Dr. Verghese Kurien

Operation Flood started the White Revolution in India and made our country self-sufficient in milk and this was achieved entirely through the cooperative structure. Today around 12 million farmers in more than 22 states across the country own around 250 dairy plants handling around 20 million litres of milk a day. This is a remarkable achievement. While we in India tend to take our achievement for granted, this feat elicited high praise and admiration throughout the world. In 1955 our butter imports were 500 tons per year; today our cooperatives alone produce more than 12,000 tons of butter. Similarly, we imported 3000 tons of baby food in 1955; today our cooperatives alone produce 38,000 tons of baby food. By 1975 all imports

of milk and milk products stopped. The import permitted was that of food aid under Operation Flood. A separate agency called the Indian Dairy Corporation (IDC) was created to receive grants of food aid and use it in the Operation Flood, this agency was also headed by the marvelous Dr. Verghese Kurien.” “Milk powder production increased from 22,000 tons in the pre-operational Flood year to 1,40,000 tons by 1989. In 1998 the World Bank published a report on the impact of dairy development in India and looked at its own contribution to this. The audit revealed that of the Rs 200 crore the world bank invested in Operation Flood, the net return on India's rural economy was a massive Rs 24,000 crore each year over a period of 10 years to which no other dairy programme has ever matched. Moreover when Amul started there were so many competitors in the market like Polson and other foreign players but Amul stood the test of time and over the years emerged as India's favorite. Hope and Pray that we rise above small bikerings and help the White Revolution.
